



CALIFORNIA LIONS CAMP

California Lions Camp recently awarded two grants. A \$5,000 grant was given to Mind in Motion, a new sensory gym located in Sonora. Founder, Jamie Tholcke, will open her gym in June, offering experiences for neuro-diverse children. The grant enabled her to buy equipment and offer scholarships.

The second grant, of \$13,200 was awarded to Camp Taylor to help build a ropes course. As Kimberlie explained, children with heart conditions have been told so many times, "You can't do this, you can't do that." With protective equipment, guidance, and support, this high-level ropes course will challenge children physically and mentally while promoting teamwork, communication, and problem-solving.

Glasses: 25,000 As your Chairperson for glasses recycling, I wish to thank the many clubs who have contributed 25,000 pairs of glasses that have been taken to Vallejo so far this year. These will be cleaned, scanned for prescriptions, boxed, and either sent to existing Lions in Sight facilities around the world for distribution, or used in temporary clinics in many third-world countries. Your contributions are being put to good use. Actually, we do not know exactly how many were donated - because there were many boxes/bags of glasses with no names or amounts on them. If you are coming to a District Meeting, or if I'm picking them up, please remember to put at least your club's name on each container and (if you have time) the number of glasses within. Thank you.

Pull-Tabs: 295 Nearly 200 pounds of pull-tabs were picked up at the District Meeting. These, along with another 100 pounds, were taken to the Ronald McDonald House in Sacramento - for a total donation of more than 295 pounds, or more than \$1,000 (because of matching recycler funds). Chowchilla Lions were a big contributor, with more than 50 pounds donated.



An estimated 700,000 people die by suicide every year (World Health Organization). 

On average, 2% of health budgets go to mental health (World Health Organization). 

People who are exposed to adverse circumstances – including poverty, violence, disability and inequality – are at **higher risk** of developing a mental health condition (World Health Organization). 

Depression is the leading cause of disability globally, affecting an estimated more than 300 million people worldwide – the majority of them women, young people and the elderly (United Nations). 

For depression, the gaps in service coverage are wide across all countries: in high-income countries, an estimated 23% of cases receive **minimally adequate treatment** for depression and in low- and lower-middle income countries this is estimated at 3% of cases (World Health Organization). 

More than 80% of all people with mental disorders live in low- and middle-income countries, where the vicious cycle between mental health and poverty is particularly prevalent because of a lack of welfare safety nets and poor accessibility to effective treatment (World Health Organization). 

Service Ideas

Promote education, awareness and advocacy resources and tools from reputable organizations such as the [World Health Organization](#) and [World Federation for Mental Health](#).



Explore the [World Health Organization's mental health and well-being stigma reduction resources](#) and promote them using social media to highlight the importance of lessening mental health stigma and debunking common misconceptions.



Contact local, state/province and federal government representatives to advocate for increased mental health funding and expanded services. Use our [Lions Advocacy Toolkit](#) to get started.



Explore ways to increase access to vital mental health screening services in your community among underserved groups by contacting and utilizing mental health professionals, psychologists and psychiatric physicians in your networks. Connect with local stakeholders such as schools, hospitals and community leaders to collaborate on shared goals.



Find your region or country's suicide prevention hotline using the [International Association for Suicide Prevention's international suicide crisis hotline search feature](#) and promote the hotline at awareness events and on social media.



Use resources, facts and statistics from the World Health Organization and World Federation for Mental Health to create a [World Mental Health Day](#) social media campaign with your club, district or multiple district. Share your impact on social media with photos, videos and other assets using the hashtag #WorldMentalHealthDay.



Donate food, toiletries or maintenance services to a local transitional living home serving disabled individuals and/or those living with various mental health conditions in your community.



Lions Vision & Health Fair (STOCKTON San Joaquin Lions Club)



The STOCKTON San Joaquin Lions Club was thrilled to be able to hold a free Vision & Health Fair in tandem with Community Partnership for Families of San Joaquin's Multicultural Health & Resource Fair on October 5, 2024. We promoted the event heavily through sharing fliers to local farmworkers, shelters and other service organizations, recording a PSA, and posting on social media and community calendars. Our committee held several planning meetings with Dr. Eleanor Britter from Peninsula Special Interest Lions Clubs, Lions in Sight, optometrists, San Joaquin Delta College's nurses, and Health Careers Academy High School to get all the needed items and personnel in place. We recruited the 30+ volunteers needed for all the vision and medical services. Our club members, along with Lions partners from around the district, served on October 5 by helping perform diabetes testing, blood pressure checks, spot vision screenings, and eye doctor checks. Those in need were provided with refurbished eyeglasses and secured gift certificates to order glasses for those who could not use the glasses that were in stock. We screened 215 individuals and held two subsequent callback events to finish out the line when needed to be cut off. They took place on November 2 and 17, with two different Lion optometrists volunteering. We were able to order new glasses for 62 patients, and many went home with refurbished pairs on October 5. We sought partnerships and grant funding from two neighboring clubs, District 4-A1, and Multiple District Four to help us provide lunch for all the vendors and volunteers at both the Lions Vision & Health Fair and the Multicultural Health & Resource Fair, hoping to market membership opportunities among those service-minded students and people. We recruited a member while planning this project, and hope to keep building these relationships! Many glasses requests are coming our way because of this marketing campaign.




